

LA BOUSSOLE CANNON

This centron is a relic from a tragic chapter in France's exploration history.

It is a one-pounder perner bronze cannon that fired metal or stone shot.

in 1785. King Louis XVI chose Jean-François de Galaup, Comte de La Pérouse, to lead an expedition into the Pacific, commanding LA BOUSSOLE and L'ASTROLABE.

The ships spent three years mapping and recording regions of the Pacific before disaster struck and they disappeared. One theory concerning their fate claims that after being hit by a fluricane near Vanikoto Island in the Solomons, L.a. Boussout sank, and most of the men drowned or were killed by Islanders, La Pérouse among them.

L'ASTROLABE suffered a smiler misfortune.
Trapped on a reef off Paeu Bay, her crew threw guns overboard in a futile effort to free the ship.
Her survivors built a small boot and sailed off, never to be seen again.

Weckage from the ships was first found in 1826. In 1959 Reece Discombe, a New Zealand diver, rediscovered the wreck of L'Astrocage and in 1962 found LA Boussoue. Reports from the diver who retrieved this comnon suggest that it came from LA Boussoue.
